#### **Population and Gender**

The gender distribution of an area can provide additional insight into the region's overall distribution in the population by male and female. Of the area's population, 5,248 were male which represents 51.8 percent and 4,876 were female which represents 48.2 percent. This compares to the statewide percentage of 49.6 percent for male and 50.4 percent for female.

#### Special Age Groups and Gender

<u>Youth and Older Workers:</u> Other age cohorts may be of special interest for Workforce Development Board's summer youth programs and older worker programs. The Parmer County region has 1,518 persons age 15-24, representing 15.0 percent of the population. This compares with 14.6 percent statewide. For the potential older age cohort, 2,284 persons or 22.6 percent are 55 or over in the Parmer County region based on the 2014 American Community 5- year Survey. This compares to 22.1 percent statewide.

<u>Ages 25-44:</u> If the population cohort 45 and over is higher than the state average, this suggests a stable, mature population comprised of mainly "empty-nesters," retirees and the aged. When the 25-44 age cohorts is higher than the state average, this is a healthy economic situation since this group contains the greatest share of the labor force. Decreases over time in this group, especially when similar changes are not occurring statewide, can be an indication that people are moving out of an area they consider to be a poor labor market. In Parmer County the total number in the age groups of 25 to 44, was 2,497 or 24.7 percent. This compares to a statewide percentage of 28.0 percent based on the 2014 American Community 5- year Survey.

<u>Ages 65 and Older</u>: For the population who are considered to be at the age of retirement or older - 65 years and older, the total number of persons in Texas was 2,849,757 or 10.9 percent of the total population in the ACS 2014 5-year Survey. This region had a total of 1,244 or 12.3 percent in this older age group.

<u>Veteran Status</u>: According to the U.S. Bureau of Census, the area had 315 persons in the population as Veterans from 2011-2015. A "civilian veteran" is a person 18 years old or over who has served (even for a short time), but is not now serving, on active duty in the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, or the Coast Guard, or who served in the U.S. Merchant Marine during World War II. People who served in the National Guard or military Reserves are classified as veterans only if they were ever called or ordered to active duty, not counting the 4-6 months for initial training or yearly summer camps.

<u>Disability Status</u>: According to the US Census Quickfacts for the years 2011-2015, data on Disability Status were derived when respondents reported long-lasting conditions: (a) blindness, deafness, or a severe vision or hearing impairment, (sensory disability) and (b) a condition that substantially limits one or more basic physical activities such as walking, climbing stairs, reaching, lifting, or carrying (physical disability). Disability status was also derived if the individuals in the working age range of 21 to 64 years had a physical, mental, or emotional condition lasting 6 months or more that made it difficult to perform certain activities such as: (a) learning, remembering, or concentrating (mental disability); (b) dressing, bathing, or getting around inside the home (self-care disability); (c) going outside the home alone to shop or visit a doctor's office (going outside the home disability); and (d) working at a job or business (employment disability).

#### **Population Projections**

The Office of the State Demographer for the State of Texas distributes the most widely used population projections for Texas. The current projections are for the population of the State and all counties in the State for each year from 2010 through 2050. Those released by the program in November 2012 have been revised using the most recent birth and death data and also the most recent information on special populations. They are by single years of age for ages 0 through 85 years of age and older for males and females in each of the four racial/ethnic groups — Non-Hispanic Whites, Non-Hispanic Blacks, Hispanics (of all races), and persons from Non-Hispanic, other racial/ethnic groups. The total population represents the sum of these four racial/ethnic groups, being equal to the 2010 census count for the State of Texas and for all counties in Texas. It is also necessary to adjust the base population for "special populations" such as college populations, prison populations, military base populations, and other persons in institutional settings. These populations are unique in that they reside in an area, usually in institutional settings, and do not generally experience the same demographic processes over time as the local population in the area. They tend to come into and leave an area at fixed intervals. Examples of Special populations must be removed from the base populations of projection areas before birth, death and migration rates are applied to the base population because their movement into and out of an area is due to events (e.g., enrollment, graduation, incarceration) and are not determined by local socioeconomic conditions. Special populations are, examined as a separate projection and their projection data is added to the projected base cohorts to obtain the projection of the total population.



#### **Occupations and Employment:**

The best source of occupational information at the county level is from the 2014 5 year American Community Survey. The Total labor force 16 years and older for Parmer County was 65.2%. The total number of persons 16 years of age or older who were employed in Parmer County during the 2014 5year Census is 62.8%. Parmer County had more persons in the labor force and a higher rate of employment than both Texas and the US.


**Employment by Major Industry Sector:** The most recent employment data from TWC by major industrial sector for Parmer County compared to Texas are shown below in a table for two years. The Department of Labor calls these major categories "Super Sectors". One advantage in reviewing employment changes at broad industrial levels is that it allows for a unique snapshot of major differences in the total employment for a selected study area when compared to any larger statewide trend. When employment changes at a higher rate than the state, there may be comparative advantages in the local economy which are driving these changes. Conversely, when change is at a lower rate, then the Super Sector is showing less change in comparison to the state and may consequently have a smaller comparative change impact.-

The table above shows that Parmer County changed at about the same rate as the State of Texas and U.S. for "Total, All Industries" between 1st quarter 2013 and 1st quarter 2014. This is reflected in the changes in "Business & Other Services" and "Education & Health Services".

**Class of Worker:** Another way to view the types of workers in an area's labor force is by class of worker. According to the 2014 American Community Survey (ACS) estimates, the area had 3,692 employees who were private wage and salary workers representing 79 percent of all workers. The region had another 526 persons who were government workers or 11.2 percent, 433 who were self-employed workers or 9.3 percent and 25 who were unpaid family workers representing 0.5 percent. This compares to the Texas statewide distribution of 78.8 percent for private wage and salary workers, 14. 3 percent for government workers, 6.7 percent for self-employed, and 0.2 percent for unpaid family workers.

**Unemployment:** According to Texas Workforce Commission (TWC), unemployment figures for September 2016, Parmer County had an unemployment estimate of 139 persons which represents a rate of 2.8 compared to a Texas statewide unemployment rate of 4.9 for the same month. For the study area, these estimates represent an increase from September 2015 unemployment rate of 2.5 percent. The Texas statewide unemployment rate was 4.5 for September 2015

**Commuting to Work:** According to the 2010-2014 American Community Survey 5-year Estimates, the number of workers 16 and over commuting to work has a number of implications for transportation and municipal services. Parmer County had 72.4 percent who drove their car to work alone, 17.6 percent who car pooled, 0.7 percent used public transportation, 3.5 percent who walked to work, 0.3 percent of regional workers who used other means to work, and 5.6 percent who worked at home. These methods of commuting to work compare to the Texas statewide results by: car alone (80%), car pool (11.0%), public transportation (1.6%), walked (1.6%), other means (1.8%), and worked at home (4.1%).





**Per Capita Income:** Per capita income as defined by the US Census Bureau is the mean income computed for everyone to include: every man, woman, and child in a particular group including those living in group quarters. It is derived by dividing the aggregate income of a particular group by the total population in that group. "Total personal income is a widely used measure of regional economic health while per capita income is generally used to compare the relative well-being of residents across areas (not accounting for differences in area cost of living). The per capita personal income for 2014 was \$20,381 in Parmer County while Texas statewide had a per capita income of \$26,999 in 2015 dollars for 2011-2015. The National per capita income was \$28,930 in the same year.




#### **Income of Households**

**Income in the Past 12 Months**: This includes the income of the householder and all other individuals 15 years old and over that live in the household, whether or not they are related to the householder. Because many households consist of only one person, average household income is usually less than average family income. Although the household income statistics cover the past 12 months, the characteristics of individuals and the composition of households reported refer to the information gathered at the time of the census interview. Thus, the income of the household during some portion of the past 12 months if these individuals are not residents of the household at the time of interview. Similarly, if individuals who did not reside in the household during the past 12 months but were members of the household at the time of interview, their income amounts are included. The median household income for Parmer County in 2015 dollars for the years 2011-2015 was \$45,326 as compared to Texas which was \$53,207 and the US average of \$53,889.


**Other Income:** Parmer County households received earnings from five different sources. These sources are 85.5 percent earnings, 26.8 percent Social Security, 9.4 percent retirement income, 2.8 percent supplemental security income, and 1 percent cash public assistance income. The average income from Social Security was \$15,587 per year. It may be noted that some of these households may have received earnings from more than one of the sources listed above.

#### **Poverty Population:**

According to the US Census American Community Survey 2014 five year estimate Parmer County has 26.2 percent of children under 18 years in poverty. There was 13.7 percent between the ages of 18-64 in poverty and those 65 and older accounted for 14.8 percent. Texas had a total poverty rate of 17.7, under 18 years 25.3, 18 to 64 years 15.5, and over 65 years 11.2 percent. There is a minimal difference between the poverty rates for Parmer County and Texas. Both Parmer and Texas are higher than the national average.

**Gross Retail Sales:** Income can be viewed in several ways and under different definitions. Per capita income tends to have a direct relationship with the growth of gross sales and most service sector industries in an area. **Gross sales** for the region estimated by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts were \$18,905,297 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2015 which represented an increase of 5.2 percent to \$19,905,297 by the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2016. The statewide change for the same period was an increase of 5.3 percent in gross sales. The total number of **reporting outlets** for the same period was 77 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2015 and 78 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2016. According to the state comptroller **use tax** is the cost of all taxable items removed from inventory for personal or business use and all purchases on which no Texas sales tax was paid or use tax accrued.

**Household Units and Families:** According to the American Community Survey 2010-2014 5year Parmer County had 3,300 households with families making up 76% of those households. Families are defined as married couples which accounted for 58% and other families which accounted for 19%. Other families is defined as female householders with no husband present and children under 18 years. 24% of households were nonfamily. This includes people living alone, and families were no one was related to the householder. Forty-two percent of these households had one or more persons under 18 years of age and 25 percent of households had one or more members 65 years and older.

There were a 9 million households in Texas for the survey year 2011-2014. For the state total families made up 70% of households, married couples 50%, and other families 8%. Nonfamily households made up 30 percent in which most were persons living alone. Thirty-eight percent of these households had one or more persons under 18 years of age and 22 percent of households had a population of one or more persons under 65 years of age.

The marital status of residents in Parmer County is as follows:



**Occupied Housing**: Of the 3,300 occupied housing units in Parmer County, the average household size was three, 70% percent were owner occupied and 30% were renter occupied. 62% of these householders had moved since the 2000. It was estimated that only 1% didn't have a telephone and 4% had no vehicle, 31% had three or more vehicles and about double the amount of homes were heated with gas as compared to electricity. The median monthly payment for mortgaged owner was \$1,138, non-mortgage owners \$366, and renters \$635.

In Texas there was an estimated 2.8 persons per household. There was 5.7 million or 67% owner occupied and 37% renter occupied. It was estimated that about 72% of these householders moved since 2000. The median monthly payment for mortgaged owner was \$1,443, non-mortgage owners \$459, and renters \$870.

**Housing Characteristics**: In 2010-2014, Parmer County had a total of 3,800 housing units, 14 percent were vacant, 82 percent were in single-unit structures, 6 percent were in multi-unit structures, and 13 percent were mobile homes. An estimated 20 percent of the housing units were built since 1990.


#### **Education and Schools**

According to the United States Department of Agriculture Educational Attainment update for 2016, educational levels in Parmer County for ages 16 and above was lower in three categories when compared to Texas. Those with less than high school education was 35% in Parmer County compared to Texas 18.4%, and the US average of 13.7%. Parmer County was 21.1% vs Texas with 29.3% for persons with some college and 15.8% of people graduating college as compared to 27.1% in Texas. The percentage for those completing high school was similar in Texas and Parmer County.

**Dropout and Attrition Rates:** In 2014-2015 a Texas Public Education Attrition Study was created by the Intercultural Development Research Association (IDRA). IDRA's goal is to create schools

that work for children. They conduct research and development activities; creates, implements and administers innovative education programs; and provides teacher, administrator, and parent training and technical assistance. The report showed that Parmer County had an attrition rate of 19% or less as compared to Texas which had a rate of 24%. For Texas the attrition rate for Native Americans was 19%, Asian/ Pacific Islanders 13%, Blacks 26%, Whites 14%, Hispanics 31%, and Multiracial 23%. Male attrition was equal to or higher for all races. Rates for Parmer County by race where masked for student identification protection. Parmer County is in Education Service Center (ESC) 16. ESC 16 had an attrition rate equal to the state rate. Overall it is reported that high school attrition rates have worsened in Parmer County since last year.

Texas public schools are not graduating 1 out of 4 students overall, and are still losing 1 in 3 Hispanics and 1 in 4 Black students. Although the number of students is still high the attrition rate for the State of Texas has dropped significantly for all races since 1985-1986. The gap in attrition rate still exists between races. In 2014-2015 Black and Hispanic students were two times more likely to leave school, male attrition is higher than female, and attrition rates appear to be higher in regions with the largest student population. **Health Practitioners:** According to the Texas Department of State Health Services 2015 data, there were two Direct Patient Care (DPC) physicians, three Nurse Practitioners, and two Physician Assistants who practiced in the region. The ratio of total persons to each physician in the area was 5,629 residents per each physician. This compares to a statewide ratio of 563 persons for each physician in Texas. Another way of reporting these figures is by showing the number of physicians as a ratio per 100,000 residents. According to 2015 DSHS data the study area had 23 Licensed Vocational Nurses with a ratio of 2015 population to LVN of 489.5. There were 29 Registered Nurses (RN) with a ratio 2015 population to RN of 388.2. According to a breakdown by DSHS Parmer County had 3 Nurse Practitioners (NP) with ratio of NP to 100,000 population of 26.6, no certified nurse anesthetists, clinical nurse specialists or midwives. The state ratio of population to LVN was 489.5 and to RN was 139.5. Texas has a total of 638 NPs, 3,275 Certified Nurse Anesthetists, and 1,182 Clinical Nurse Specialists. 




**Health Statistics** - Some of the leading causes of mortality in Texas include malignant neoplasms or cancer, heart disease, and chronic lower respiratory disease. From information gathered by Texas Department of State Health Services for 2014, the study area had a total of 8 reported deaths from malignant neoplasm cancer. On a statewide level, Texas had 38,727 reported deaths from malignant neoplasm cancer. Texas Department of State Health Services reports that for 2014 there were 21 deaths from heart disease, and 3 deaths from lower respiratory disease in the selected study area. By contrast, Texas statewide had 41,293 deaths from heart disease and 6,642 deaths from chronic lower respiratory disease. For other causes of death see table below.







Several state agencies collect statistics on health status indicators that can be used to assess the strengths or weaknesses of public health in a local area or community. According to the Texas Department of State Health Services Center for Health Statistics for the year 2014, the Parmer County area had a total of 144 live births which represents a live birth rate of 15.1 births for every 1,000 persons in the study area compared to a statewide rate of 14.6 births per 1,000 persons in the population. The area had a total of 0 infant deaths.

The Texas Department of State Health Services reported that for 2014 there were 10 total teen pregnancies in this area. There were different teen pregnancy rates in the study area depending on race, with 0 for Black teens, 7 for Hispanic teens and 2 for White teens. Texas pregnancy rates for white teens was 7,117, Black teens 4,512, Hispanic teens 23,063, other teens 824. The Hispanic population accounted for the highest teenage birth rates for 2014.





# **Patient Demographics**







#### **Parmer Medical Center**

Parmer County's first and only hospital resides in Friona Texas. The first "hospital" was opened above the bank and served as a clinic type setting in 1946. In 1947, barracks were purchased and constructed as the first hospital known as Parmer County Community Hospital. As the county population continued to increase there was a need to build a new facility in 1956. Serving the county and community health needs for many years and seeing even more growth, the current hospital was built and opened in 2010. Along with the opening of the new hospital, the name was officially changed to Parmer Medical Center in May, 2009. Serving the health needs of Parmer County for over 70 years, the hospital has seen many changes, not only in structure, but with growth and increase in government regulations. **Staffing Concerns** - With the continued growth in the population of Parmer County, the hospital has been able to maintain qualified staff to care for the community healthcare needs. The staff receives continuing education and training from courses which increase their knowledge and improve their skills. The nursing staff receives advanced training in cardiac, trauma, and pediatric life support on a regular basis. The one area of concern is with computer training which the adoption of Electronic Health Records (EHR) has brought into the medical community. The other area of concern during the past few years is the ability to attract physicians to the area to work in the connected Health Clinic. Rural communities are unable to compete with the salaries of urban areas creating a struggle in recruiting physicians to the area for long periods of time. Parmer Medical Center is currently in need of a physician in the Emergency Department and has two openings in the clinic as well.

**Government Regulations** - Parmer Medical Center has a Critical Access Hospital designation which was created to reduce financial vulnerability and improve access to healthcare in rural communities. This designation is given by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). This program was designed to help rural communities obtain cost-based reimbursement from Medicare plus 1% to increase revenues in order to prevent rural hospital closures. However, with the increase in government regulations it is getting more difficult for rural community hospital's to afford and keep up with the changes. Adoption of Electronic Health Records (EHR) and the requirements of meeting the objectives of Meaningful Use have put more financial burdens on many hospitals. There seems to be more emphasis on improving quality of care for the same or fewer reimbursement dollars. This has increased concerns within the hospital community leaving them wondering how to keep up with changing regulations and what the long-term viability of the hospital will be.

**Services** – Parmer Medical Center has many services they offer the county. Due to the growing needs of the rural area, they are continuing to evaluate and look at ways to bring additional services to the community. Below is a list of the services which are currently being offered.

**Inpatient Services-** Acute Inpatient - Provide acute admissions for up to 96 hours on the average. This is for any patient that can't be treated on an outpatient basis.

- Observation This is when more information is needed to determine if patient needs an acute admission or can be treated outpatient.
- Swing Bed This is for services requiring a skilled need for an undetermined length, such as IV therapy, physical therapy.
- Respite –Parmer Medical Center currently has a contract with Hospice to provide patients a place to stay to relieve family members.

- Physical Therapies Provide Physical, Occupational & Speech Therapists that work with patients who are admitted.
- Laboratory Provide a large array of laboratory tests. Most tests can be done in house but some tests are sent out.
- Radiology Provide X-Rays in house either stationary or portable, CT Scans & MRIs
- EKG's Provide electrical tracings of the heart.
- Pharmacy Full line of medications to service available to patients.
- Social Services Provide Social Service needs for patients.
- Dietary Provide certified dietitian services.
- Chaplain Service Dedicated Chaplains make daily rounds to patients.

#### **Outpatient Services**

- Laboratory Provides lab tests to anyone with a physician's order.
- Most lab tests are done in house, some are sent out.
- Radiology Provides X-Rays, CT Scans & MRIs to anyone with physician's order.
- Emergency Department The Emergency Department is open 24 hours a day seven days a week to provide care to patients with emergencies.
- Bone Densinometer A 10 minute test that measures bone density to determine loss of bone mass.
- Wound Care Provide scheduled wound care visits offered in outpatient physical therapy department
- Holter Monitor A 24-hour device that monitors tracings of a patient's heart for diagnostic purposes.
- Procedure Room A specific room to perform various types of procedures.
- Physical Therapies Provide Physical, Occupational & Speech Therapists.
- Forensic Program Provide sexual assault & abuse exams.
- Physicals Provide Department of Transportation (DOT) physicals available in the Clinic
- Workers Comp Provide a detailed workers comp program in the Clinic; assists employers to save money & helps employees recover in a timely manner.

**Clinics**-Friona Rural Health Clinic - doctors specialize in caring for your whole family. It currently employs 3 physicians, a Family Nurse Practitioner, and Physician Assistant. Open Monday through Friday 9AM to 5PM. Same-day appointments are available and walk-in patients accepted. The services of the clinic include:

- Annual Health screens
- Vaccine for children program
- Women's Health Provide specific services to women's needs including a Healthy Baby

program and dietary education.

- Sports Medicine and Orthopedic Clinic Full range of services provided two days per month.
- Cardiology Clinic Board certified cardiologist provides services for pre-treatment consultations and post-treatment follow-up visits monthly
- Podiatry Clinic Provide routine patient care & diabetic care monthly
- Gastroenterology and Hepatology Clinic Board certified gastroenterologist and hepatologist has clinic every three weeks
- Urology Clinic board certified Urologist provides services for pre-treatment consultations and post-treatment follow-up visits as well as other treatments monthly
- Chronic Care Clinic Diabetes education to address the disease. Developed as an 1115
  Waiver project, patients spend extended amount of tine with social worker, nurse
  practitioner, and dietician to increase personal interest in care and management of the
  disease. It has made a huge difference in many of their patients managing their disease.

#### **Community Activities**

- Health Fair Provide a community health fair for kids and senior citizens
- High School Health Fair
- Neighborhood night out Block party for the police community
- High School Shadow Program Juniors & Seniors program to learn about what each department in the hospital does. Learn medical terminology, practical skills for interviewing and job application process.
- CNA Classes offered to high school students and community. Course is free.

Parmer Medical Center is involved in two projects with Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. They provide services for Project FRONTIER and are part of the Community Health Worker program.

Parmer Medical Center has looked into other services i.e. dialysis, cancer treatment therapy, but according to studies done on services, they are not financially able to set up at this time. There are other services they are looking into developing, but their most concerns about health care is the influx of cancer patients and the growing number of ethnic groups moving into the county. Many of these individuals and families are uninsured and utilize the Emergency Department as a clinic. There is also an increase in the number of seniors with reduced insurance coverage and those in the younger population not able to afford insurance.


Many counties are seeing an increase in Behavioral Health issues including Parmer County which does not have any facilities which can serve individuals with these issues. The closest MHMR

facility is located in Plainview, Texas which is 75 miles southeast of Friona, TX. There are not enough mental health beds available in the area and it takes about 8-10 hours to get a patient transported, usually via police car, to the help they need. Although telemedicine equipment is available, it is difficult to find a physician and credentialing is a "legal hoop" problem.


**Natural Disaster** – The blizzard of 2016 brought about other obstacles for Parmer County. Being hit with 20 inches of snow and ice and 12 foot snow drifts, brought challenges for the County as well as the Hospital. Most of the county was at a total standstill. Many employees were unable to get to the hospital, but with the help of a few individuals with four wheel drive vehicles, some staff were able to get to work. The staff on duty lived in the facility for a few days and even shoveled snow so emergency vehicles could get to the facility. The Department of Transportation was not able to get into the city of Friona to assist for several days. Due to the derailment of a train between Friona and New Mexico, a crew traveling through helped to get the road opened to Clovis, New Mexico. Being an agriculture county, 10-30 thousand dairy cattle were lost and 400,000 cows in the feed yard were impacted as well as. Prior to this devastating blizzard, Parmer County was suffering from drought issues.

#### Health Insurance Coverage

According to the US Census American Community Survey, Parmer County ranked lower in all areas of insurance provider coverage when compared to Texas. Parmer County also had a lower rate of persons with health insurance coverage and private insurance coverage. Their rate of public insurance coverage was equal to that of Texas and lower than the US average. Parmer County had a higher rate of persons with no insurance as compared to Texas and the US, and a higher rate of uninsured under 18 years of age.
